

ACCIDENT.—As John B. Earnshaw, esq., engineer in charge of the city water works, was leaving the engine house at the river about 5 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, he met with a serious and nearly fatal accident: As he got into his buggy to return to the city, the horse becoming unmanageable, dashed the vehicle against some trees near by, upsetting it and throwing Mr. Earnshaw out upon the frozen ground. The workmen at the engine house hearing the noise, came to the spot and found Mr. E. on the ground with the wreck of the carriage upon him. He was at once taken to a house near by, and was brought, still unconscious to the Leland Hotel at a late hour on Saturday evening. Dr. Wohlgenuth was summoned, and remained with the patient until Sunday morning, and has been almost constantly in attendance since.

Mr. Earnshaw recovered consciousness yesterday morning, and to-day is very much better. His injuries, though severe, are not considered dangerous. His brother, Henry Earnshaw, esq., arrived on Sunday morning from Chicago. The horses which caused the accident were secured upon the spot. They have several times run away and endangered life and limb.
