Denomination, inter-

§ 2. Each of said bonds shall be of the denomination of five hundred dollars, with coupons attached, bearing interest at the rate of five per centum per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of May and November in each and every year. And each of said bonds shall become due and payable on the first day of May in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and six.

Execution of bonds

Sale.

§ 3. Said bonds shall recite on their face, that they are issued under and by virtue of this act and the said bonds and the coupons thereto attached, shall be signed by the president of the board of trustees, and treasurer of the village of Oneonta, and attested by the corporate seal of said village; and they shall be sold by said trustees at public auction to the highest bidder, or by sealed bids therefor, but not at less than their par value.

Tax for payment of bonds and interest.

- § 4. The board of trustees of the village of Oneonta, in the county of Otsego, is hereby authorized to assess, levy and collect on the taxable property of said village, and to include the same in their annual tax levy, a sum sufficient each year to pay off and discharge the several sums of interest and principal on said bonds as the same become due and payable
 - § 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

Chap. 500.

AN ACT to legalize the several acts, transactions and proceedings of the trustees, and board of trustees, water commissioners and board of water commissioners of the village of Saint Johnsville, in Montgomery county, state of New York.

BECAME a law May 11, 1896, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, three-fifths being present.

. The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Act, etc., legalized.

Section 1. The several acts, transactions and proceedings of the trustees and board of trustees, and the water commissioners and board of water commissioners of the village of Saint Johnsville, in Montgomery county, state of New York, relating to the calling and holding of the special election for an additional water supply

system for said village, held on the first day of August, eighteen hundred and ninety-five, are hereby legalized, ratified and confirmed, and declared to be legal and effective; and the several acts, transactions and proceedings of the trustees and board of trustees, and the water commissioners and board of water commissioners in and for said village within the scope of their authority, relating to the said additional water supply system constructed after and pursuant to said special election are, and each thereof is hereby legalized, ratified and confirmed and declared to be legal and effective for any and all purposes; but rooms, this act shall not affect any suit action or proceeding now pending.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Chap. 501.

AN ACT to legalize the conveyance of certain land from the town of Plattsburgh to the Freydenburgh Falls Pulp company.

Became a law May 11, 1896, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The town of Plattsburgh is hereby authorized and Town and empowered to sell to the Freydenburgh Falls Pulp company the sell land. following described land: All that certain piece or parcel of land situate in the said town of Plattsburgh and is a part of the premises conveyed by William Stone and Charles W. Merritt and their wives to Eli Young by deed, bearing date the thirtieth day, of August, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, and recorded in the Clinton county clerk's office in liber fifty-eight of deeds, on pages nine hundred and sixty-four and nine hundred and sixty-five. on the tenth day of March, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, and is bounded and described as follows, to wit: Commencing at a stake and stones set in the east line of the said land so conveyed to said Young as aforesaid, about half way up the side of the bank of the hill on said premises; running thence north four degrees east in the east line of the said piece conveyed to said Young as aforesaid fourteen chains and thirty-nine links to a stake; thence north eighty-seven degrees west six chains and fourteen links to the center of the road leading up the hill to the pres-76
