

To the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Virginia,  
The Petition of the President and Common Council of the Corporation of  
Winchester respectfully represents, that they have deemed it necessary for  
the interest and convenience of the inhabitants, to substitute cast iron pipes  
for conveying water into the Corporation, instead of the wooden pipe, which  
have heretofore been used for that purpose: that to effect this object, they must  
borrow a sum of money; and have passed a Law providing for procuring and  
laying the said iron pipes, and to issue Stock for the amount that it will be  
necessary to borrow: that several persons, are willing to loan the amount required,  
but suggest doubt, as to the powers of the Corporation to create a loan for such  
a purpose. Your petitioners, in order to satisfy the minds of those who entertain  
doubts upon the subject, inserted a clause in the act which they passed, directing  
an application to the Legislature for its sanction to the object aforesaid:  
They therefore respectfully pray that your honourable body will enact a Law,  
authorising and empowering them to create a loan for the purpose herein-  
mentioned, and authorising them to borrow money hereafter for public purpose when  
deemed expedient.

## AN ACT

*Providing for procuring and laying iron pipes for conveying water into the corporation, and repealing the former law upon the same subject.*

Whereas it is deemed expedient, for various reasons, to substitute cast iron pipes for conveying water into the corporation instead of those now in use:

Sec. 1. *Be it enacted by the President and Common Council of the Corporation of Winchester*, That John Heiskell, Alexander S. Tidball, John Bell, William L. Clark, and Henry M. Brant, be and are hereby appointed commissioners to contract for the purchase and conveyance to this corporation of a sufficient quantity of iron pipes, for the purpose of conveying the water from the spring on the land now owned by Thomas A. Tidball, to the corporation, and through the various streets that are now supplied by the pipes already in use, and to such other parts of the corporation as it may be found practicable to convey the water to. The said iron pipes to be of the following dimensions, viz: The main pipe from the spring to the jail to be six inches diameter; those for Loudoun street to be three inches diameter; and those to be laid for the other streets to be two inches diameter, excepting Stewart street, and Piccadilly and Boscowen streets from Cameron street east, which ure to be one and a half inch in diameter; and those to be used for conveying the water from the several pipes to the public hydrants, to be two inches diameter: Provided, however, that the said commissioners shall first purchase and lay the main pipe from the spring to the jail, as above-mentioned; and provided, also, that the said commissioners be restrained from making any further contract or engagement, until the said pipe so laid from the spring to the jail shall, in their estimation, be sufficiently tested; and that when the same, in their estimation, shall have been sufficiently tested, the said commissioners shall forthwith proceed to the purchasing and laying the other pipes, as above directed.

Sec. 2. *Be it enacted*, That the Mayor, the President of the Council, and the Clerk, are hereby appointed commissioners to borrow the sum of two thousand dollars, for the purpose of defraying the expenses of purchasing, transporting and laying the said iron pipes; for which purpose the said last named commissioners shall, forthwith, open books for the purpose of receiving subscriptions to the said loan, at some place to be designated by them, which said books shall be and remain open two days, provided the amount required shall not be subscribed; and if it shall so happen that more than the sum required by this act shall be subscribed for on the first day, the commissioners shall apportion the amount among the subscribers in proportion to the sum each may have subscribed, in such manner as they shall deem just.— And when the sum herein required is subscribed for, the said commissioners shall issue certificates of stock to the person or persons loaning the same, sealed with the seal of the corporation, bearing an interest of six per centum per annum payable on the 15th day of May and the 15th day of November in each and every year, unless the same shall happen on Sunday, in which case it shall be payable on the following day: each certificate to be numbered, made assignable, and signed by the Mayor and President of the Common Council, and countersigned by the Clerk, and to be for such sums as the persons entitled thereto shall require, provided that no certificate shall issue for a less sum than fifty dollars.

Sec. 3. *Be it enacted*, That the certificates of stock issued by virtue of this act shall be redeemable on the 15th day of November 1838, subject, however, to the discretion of the President and Common Council and their successors, who may reduce the stock so subscribed, or any part thereof, provided such part shall not be less than five per centum of the whole amount due, at any time previous to the 15th day of November 1838.

Sec. 4. *Be it enacted*, That in order to prevent delay in accomplishing the objects of this act, the said first named commissioners be authorized and directed, whenever they may deem it expedient, to borrow, upon the faith of the corporation, from one or both of the banks in this corporation, such sums of money as they may find necessary to purchase and lay the main pipe, as directed in the first section of this act, from the spring to the jail; which sum so borrowed from the banks shall be paid out of the first money received for stock created by this act.

Sec. 5. *Be it enacted*, That the water-works of the corporation, and all things pertaining thereto, as well as the faith of the corporation, be pledged for the redemption of the stock created under this act.

Sec. 6. *Be it enacted*, That it shall be the duty of the Clerk to have printed forms of certificates, which are to be issued under this act, which shall be bound in a book having a margin containing the number, date, sum and name of the person to whom such certificate shall issue.

Sec. 7. *Be it enacted*, That in order to remove the doubts that exist in reference to the power of the corporation to obtain money on loan, in the manner prescribed by this act, the subscriptions which shall be obtained for the stock authorized to be created under the second section of this act shall be contingent, and shall only be obligatory upon the subscribers in case an act of the General Assembly be obtained at the ensuing session authorizing the President and Common Council of the corporation to create such loan for the purpose aforesaid, or any expression of opinion by the Legislature, in the shape of a resolution or otherwise, that the corporation already possess the power to make such loan; and provided the legislative sanction shall thus be obtained, the commissioners appointed by the second section of this act shall immediately require from the respective subscribers to the loan, the sums respectively subscribed by them, and shall issue certificates in the manner before prescribed, and shall deposit the sum so borrowed in one or both of the banks in this corporation to the credit of the first named commissioners, to be drawn by their order, or the order of a majority of them, in such sums as may be required for the purposes aforesaid.

Sec. 8. *And be it enacted*, That the act, entitled "an act providing for procuring and laying iron pipes for conveying water into the corporation," passed the 11th day of September last, be and the same is hereby repealed.

This act shall be in force from and after the passing thereof.
